Income:

- 37% of Foster Grandparents have incomes below the Federal Poverty Level.
 - 40 households of one - under \$1005/month
 - 5 households of two - under \$1353/month
- Of the 14 lowest incomes:
 - 2 has no reportable income
 - 3 receive minimal DSS funds
 - 9 receive limited SS, SSI, or combination
- 10 highest incomes:
 - 6 are married with 2 incomes
 - 3 have combination of SS + retirement \$
 - 1 have combination of SS + work \$
- 1 used Medical Allowances to be income eligible
- 6 eligible due to 20% income increase after year one.

Household Size:

- Of 2 person households:
 - 14 are FG plus spouse
 - 2 are FG and child or grandchild
- Of 3 person households:
 - 1 is FG, Spouse and child.
