Founded in 1968, **PEACE**, **Inc.** is the federally designated **Community Action Agency** (CAA) for Syracuse and Onondaga County. We also serve portions of Oswego County. Similar to other CAAs across the country, we originate from President Lyndon B. Johnson's "War on Poverty". PEACE, Inc.'s mission is "to help people in the community realize their potential for becoming selfsufficient." Our 9 primary programs advance early childhood development and education, mentorship, socialization, family and senior services, nutrition and food security, financial empowerment, healthy and energy-efficient housing, and other social determinants of health.



Who We Serve

Each year, **PEACE**, **Inc.** serves approximately **8,500 Central New Yorkers** who are typically at or below 200% of Federal Poverty Guidelines (i.e. a single-person household making under \$29,160, a household of 4 making under \$60,000, etc.). Operating at more than **50 sites**, we meet our clients in the city, suburban, and rural neighborhoods where they reside.

What Sets Us Apart

>> Collaborative

We partner with more than 200 philanthropic, government, education, and non-profit entities.

>> Data-Driven

We release Community Needs Assessments and other forms of Public Research that raise community voice and ensure maximum impact.

>> Fiscally Responsible

We have received no audit findings or significant deficiencies in the last 18 years. Additionally, PEACE, Inc. has qualified as a low-risk auditee for the last 16 years.

>> Inclusive Governance

We practice "maximum feasible participation." Our Tripartite Board of Directors requires at least 1/3 representation of those served. Our Head Start Policy Council is parent-governed, and our other community-based advisory councils ensure our programs are nimble and responsive.



Community Impact

The arrival of Micron, the removal of the I81 viaduct, and the rebuilding of Syracuse Public Housing brings the potential for economic revival, social opportunity, and racial justice. And yet, the city of Syracuse has the second highest rate of childhood poverty in the nation, with 45.8% of city youth under the age of 18 live in poverty. Barriers to quality employment, education, health, housing, transportation, and more are felt irrespective of background, age, or location. To meet both the challenges and the possibilities of our moment, PEACE, Inc. will strive to provide holistic opportunities for individuals and families to thrive.

Our 6 Family Resource Centers provided 15,907 care management services including referrals, transportation, food pantry

referrals, transportation, food pantry and food table giveaways, diaper bank distribution, toiletry/hygiene distribution, and clothing closet usage.



Our Free Tax Prep Program filed 1763 Federal Tax Returns, bringing a total of \$2,468,774 back to the CNY economy.

Through the work of the Eastwood Community Center Donation Program, staff members, and volunteers, we distributed \$1,202,144 in clothing, non-perishable food items, toiletries, and other donations. Days such as the annual "Great Potato Giveaway" have ensured the holidays are less stressful for our families.



1652 individuals gave **21,889** volunteer hours to our agency and its clients.

We're thankful for the support of our **Head Start Parents; Foster Grandparents** and **BBBS Mentors**; corporate groups such as **Barclay Damon Law Firm** and the **Bonadio Group**, and the community at large.





57 justice-involved clients and their families received family development, job readiness services, and/or vocational training through

the Family Resource Department's Family Reentry Program. Through the support of coordinator Michael Willacy and

a host of community partners, **97%** of the program's clients did not experience a recidivating event in the **last 12 months**.

In partnership with Onondaga County Department of Long-Term Care Services, PEACE, Inc.'s Senior Congregate Meal Program returned to the Central New York Regional Market, providing 189 Seniors with 353 meals!

Head Start served more than 400 children three meals daily (breakfast, lunch, and a snack). In total, Head Start distributed 63,614 Breakfasts, 64,752 Lunches, and 61,200 Snacks to its youth. Additionally, to accommodate

children's allergies, intolerances, and cultural preferences, 23% of the children were served special diet meals.







One of only 3 year-round Free Tax Preparation Programs in the state outside of New York City, we filed 231 returns and reinvested \$422,044 into the CNY Economy during 2022's "tax off-season." During this period, we filed tax returns from as far back as 2013. We also helped historically underserved, incarcerated, disabled, and New American residents secure back stimulus checks and Child Tax Credits.

Micron Technology, Inc. Commits to PEACE, Inc., Improving CNYs Early Education/Childcare Landscape

As part of Micron Technology's \$100 billion investment to build a semiconductor manufacturing complex in Central New York, the company held an August 2 press conference with New York State Governor Kathy Hochul and provided updates about its commitment towards childcare. In particular, Senior Vice President/Chief People Officer at Micron and Micron Foundation President April Arnzen announced the company's long-term funding of the Early Childhood Career Pathways Program (ECCPP), a partnership between PEACE, Inc. and Child Care Solutions of CNY.

A pilot program funded by Onondaga County through an Alliance for Economic Inclusion grant, ECCPP helps its clients seek early childhood employment, obtain Child Development Associate Certificates, and open licensed Family Home Childcare Centers. Regarding the latter, future early childhood business owners access important training, start-up funds, and assistance in preparation for home inspections. The impact is undeniable. In a little more than 4 years, over 44 Family Home Childcare Centers have opened. All are female-owned businesses; 80% are minority-owned. In total, a potential 720 childcare slots have been created through ECCPP alone. Such success is critical; at present, there are currently enough licensed providers to meet only 44% of estimated demand.

In addition to Micron Technology, Inc., Onondaga County, and Child Care Solutions of CNY, we'd like to thank the Early Childhood Alliance of CNY and the Allyn Family Foundation for their advocacy of ECCCP and CNY's early education landscape.

September 15 marked a wonderful day for PEACE, Inc., as the agency celebrated the Grand Opening of its new Department of Energy and Housing Services (DEHS) Building on Erie Blvd West. Current and past agency administrators, its Board of Directors, staff, and the community at large celebrated the new facility, toured the offices, and witnessed an insulation demonstration. Weatherizing more than 9000 housing units in the last 10 years alone, the agency is proud of Director Sally Ward, her team, and the program's legacy of energy efficiency and cost-savings for Central New Yorkers.

PEACE, Inc. Continues Critical Strategic Design Work

Since the fall of 2022, PEACE, Inc. has pursued a Strategic Design with M.S. Hall & Associates. Such a design is a living, breathing process. It helps agencies such as PEACE, Inc. plan for the future while identifying and ultimately addressing challenges in the present.

Through design, we wish to meet the region's "postpandemic moment" where projects such I-81 and Micron will transform our community. To navigate this rapidly changing future, we sought to enhance program capacity, embed inclusivity and diversity, and elevate community voice. We looked to promote a coherent identity that enables a culture of open and direct communication, drives inclusion and belonging, and provides CNY with the anchor partner that it needs.

External and internal data drove our work. We used surveys as well as organized group and individual conversations to solicit staff and community feedback. We also adapted the work of newly charged agency IT, data, and DEI committees as well as the lessons learned from our work in the CNY Community Foundation's LeadSafeCNY Participatory Budget process and the Human Services Leadership Council of CNY.

Resulting from these processes, PEACE, Inc. looks to empower staff and community by focusing on 3 strategies, 1) leadership development, 2) belonging and DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion), 3) and technology upgrades around data collection and security. 
procedures, and community involvement. From the work, positive and sustainable change is being pursued. Notable, is our agency's recently approved vision,
